10th Anniversary Honors Collin and Countless Transplant Families



Nicki Loshnowsky never anticipated having to designate her five-year-old son, Collin, as an organ donor. And yet, in November 2004, the Loshnowsky family faced the decision after Collin was struck by a car and suffered severe

head trauma. With their world changed forever, the Loshnowskys found some light in a tragic situation by choosing donation, and Collin's gifts were life saving to the recipients of his intestine, two kidneys, liver and heart. Through the Loshnowskys active involvement with *Gift of Life Donor Program* and Gift of Life Family House, they have found a means to heal, as well as to celebrate Collin's wonderful life, all the while promoting the incredible impact of organ donation.

Over the last 10 years, the Loshnowsky family has been involved in a number of Gift of Life initiatives in Collin's memory. At the Transplant Games of America, an Olympic-style athletic competition for transplant recipients, living donors and donor families, the Loshnowsky family has been an integral member of Team Philadelphia representing donor families. At the Donor Dash,

the family bands together as Team “Captivated by Collin’s Smile” to demonstrate, through strength in numbers, how organ donation saves lives. The Loshnowsky family will always remember Collin’s infectious smile and his wonderful “belly laugh.”

This past November was Collin’s 10th “Angel-versary”, and the Loshnowsky family chose to honor his life by inspiring others to remember Collin in a very special and unique way. Collin’s mother, Nicki, created a Facebook campaign called, “10 Random Acts of Kindness for Collin Loshnowsky.” When asked how she came up with the idea for the Angel-versary campaign, Nicki explained, “A little while before the Angel-versary date, I was starting to feel very sad and depressed about the upcoming date. One particularly rough night as I was lying in bed in tears, the idea came to me, out of the blue. I firmly believe that Collin planted that idea in my head as a way of giving me something hopeful to focus on and look forward to.”

Doing their own part, the Loshnowsky family made it their fervent goal to participate in the Family House Home Cook Heroes program 10 times by the end of 2014, preparing meals for the Family House transplant patients and families. “We chose to incorporate the Home Cook Heroes program because we feel such a strong connection with the organ donation community. Most of the time when people think of organ donation saving lives, they automatically (and rightfully) think of the recipients. As a donor family, we also feel ‘saved’ through Collin’s donation. So much of our healing has been because of the positive effects we have witnessed first-hand through organ donation and through our relationship with one of Collin’s recipients, as well as the many wonderful people we have met on this journey. Grief can be



so overwhelming, but having a positive outlet to focus on, such as the Home Cook Heroes program, is truly a gift for us,” says Nicki.

The Loshnowsky’s Home Cook Hero meal on December 26 was an extra special dinner in honor of Collin’s 16th birthday. “Not only was this a milestone year with Collin’s 10th Angel-versary, it also would have been his 16th birthday. We decided that since he wasn’t here to throw a party for, we would do the next best thing and throw a birthday dinner for him at the Family House. Birthday parties with family and friends are annual traditions in our house for each of our children. We chose to serve foods that you would typically see at one of our parties....hot dogs and sauerkraut, meatball sandwiches, ring bologna and cheese, crackers, chips and pretzels. And of course no birthday party is complete without a cake! Guests at the House wished Collin a Happy Birthday, either to us, or written in thank you cards. Sharing him and his story on his special day made a hard day a little more bearable. And one of the best parts was sharing the experience with some Home Cook Hero newbies. The family and friends that joined us have been part of our Dash team for many years, but that night was their first experience with the Family House and cooking dinner.”

Nicki’s friend, Krista Moody, shares her first experience as a Home Cook Hero: “My favorite act (and most likely the one with the biggest impact) was helping to prepare and serve dinner at the House on December 26, which was also Collin’s 16th birthday. My 12-year-old daughter, Sydney, and I joined Collin’s family and friends for the party. We celebrated with a huge dinner and finished with cake and ice cream (and I secretly hoped we didn’t sing “happy birthday” because I knew I’d lose it). Although I’ve made donations and I’m very familiar with the Family House it was my first trip there. I honestly don’t know how to describe the feeling I got from the House, but it was amazing from the second I walked through the door. I can still picture every person so graciously filling their plates after what was most likely a day at the hospital for themselves or a loved one. I loved being there and I can’t wait to go back again!”

FACES OF THE Family House

Meet Savannah and Robert Anselmo

When meeting Savannah Anselmo, a rambunctious seven-year-old girl from Miramar, Florida, you would have never known that she underwent life-saving surgery as an infant.

Savannah was diagnosed with biliary atresia when she was only four months old, which eventually led to the prognosis that she was in imminent need of a new liver. After being on the waiting list for eight months, Savannah thankfully received a liver transplant at a children's hospital on December 29, 2007. Every six months, Savannah and her Dad, Robert, travel from Florida to Philadelphia for her post-transplant care and stay at their "home away from home" – Gift of Life Family House.



The Anselmo family has been in and out of the Family House since its first year of operation in 2011. After consulting with different hospital workers and even seeking advice from online forums for children with a similar condition, the buzz around the Family House sparked their interest and became their go-to lodging facility when seeking transplant-related care in the city.

Imagine having to relocate to a city that is more than 1,000 miles away from home while trying to find an affordable, temporary place to live. For Robert, financially speaking, there would not have been a practical alternative as he states, "There would be no way for us to continue care from out of town." With hotel prices continuously rising, Robert's other option would have been finding a Philadelphia-area home, which would entail renting a car, commuting to the hospital and facing city traffic – the list goes on. Thankfully, the Anselmos found the Family House, where the reduced nightly fee is not even half the cost of one night in a local hotel. Thanks to the Adopt-A-Family Fund and support from the community, we only charge guests a nightly fee of \$40, even though actual operating costs are upwards of \$160.

When staying at the Family House, Savannah loves the playroom where she can play Wii and unleash her creativity with her Lego designs. In fact, both Savannah and Robert love spending time together in the playroom where they can relax and just have fun with each other. Robert especially loves having a nightly meal prepared by the Home Cook Hero volunteers, so that he does not

have to worry about buying groceries. While Savannah is limited to the prepared meals she can eat due to her dairy allergy, the stocked pantry allows Robert to find alternative meals for her, which is maintained and organized by our dedicated volunteers. Many pantry items are donated through Wish List Drives that allow guests, like Savannah and Robert, to never go hungry.

For every six months that Savannah and Robert travel to Philadelphia for care, the Family House is happy to know that their post-transplant needs are being met. Savannah loves the Philadelphia area where she can "go around in the city to places like Franklin Square" – all with her Dad by her side. Robert loves the camaraderie and support from the other guests, as they all can relate to one another. The all-encompassing support the Family House provides to transplant patients and their families is undeniable, and for those looking to stay here, Robert has one piece of advice: "Do it in a heartbeat."

LAWRENCEVILLE SCHOOL CLUB HELPS SAVE LIVES AND SUPPORT FAMILIES

It can take just one person to inspire meaningful change, and at the Lawrenceville School in New Jersey, for many students that one person is Arthur Thomas. Arthur is a heart transplant recipient who shared his transplant story with the student body six years ago. Moved by his life-saving experience, students Taylor Bloom and Mary Hopkins heard it as a call to action to raise awareness about organ donation, and from there, the Lives Saving Lives Club was born. With Arthur as its faculty adviser, the club has blossomed into a successful, student-run initiative to raise awareness for organ donation and funds for Gift of Life Family House.

Now, with nearly 30 active members, the Lives Saving Lives Club holds a number of fundraisers, including a raffle giveaway and the Annual Organ Donor Awareness Benefit Dinner. Much like the club itself, this benefit dinner is completely student-operated. From the string quartet performance to the four-course meal, these young leaders work tirelessly to make this a memorable evening – and what a success! This past year, the dinner raised \$5,000 for the transplant patients and families of Gift of Life Family House, proving their hard work has truly paid off.

Since 2009, these motivated students have raised an incredible \$27,400 for the Family House! Their outstanding support and dedication to the Family House mission helps provide guests with comfortable lodging, hot meals, a fully stocked pantry, a free shuttle service and so much more. Such support helps alleviate stress the patients and families face day-to-day – mentally, physically and emotionally. To further support the Family House, the Lives Saving Lives Club has also served as wonderful Home Cook Heroes, cooking a delicious meal for guests of the Family House.

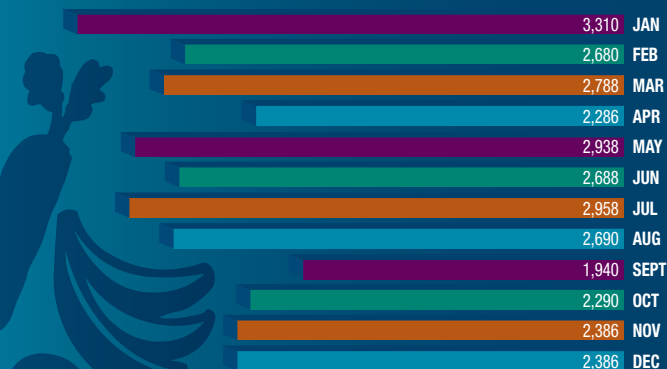

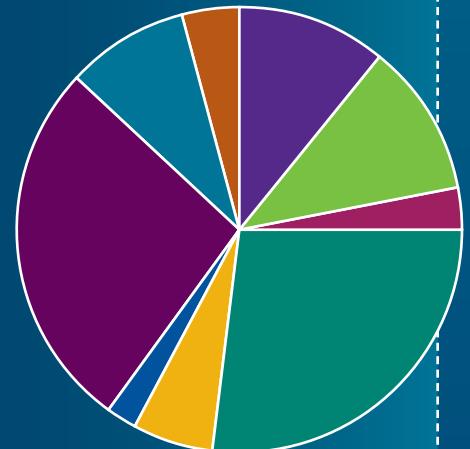


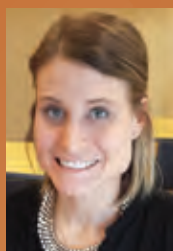

Caregiver Lifeline Spotlight

Q&A WITH PATIENTS and CAREGIVERS Waiting for Transplant

QUESTION: What has been the most surprising thing about waiting for transplant?

Patient 1: The concern others had for us. It has been humbling knowing others care.

Patient 2: The wait has been longer than expected. Four months turned into a year. Last time I was at the hospital, staff said no time frame could be given.

Caregiver 1: For me it has been watching the children's progress through this situation and how they have grown through their difficult time. Also, other people's kindness has been very surprising.

QUESTION: Which part of the waiting for the transplant are you really good at?

Patient 1: Meeting others and sharing stories, such as how and why you arrived at this point in your life. It has been a blessing to be able to help others going through the same situation just by sharing my story.

Caregiver 1: Making doctors' appointments and organizing schedules. I have also been surprised at how well I can offer comfort and support to others. And I am great at getting him (the patient) to take medicine!

QUESTION: What do you wish someone would have told you about the transplant?

Patient 1: We were pretty well prepared from knowing others who already went through the process. Thank goodness for pulmonary support groups!

Patient 2: The ups and downs of everything. I wished we learned more about the process during and after transplant – it ended up being a bit overwhelming.

QUESTION: What advice would you give a friend who says they need a transplant?

Patient 1: Be positive and go for it. It can change your life for good.

Patient 2: Take a chance. What have you got to lose?

Caregiver 1: Read as much information on it as possible. Talk to others who are in the process or have finished the process and take notes! There will be set backs and delays. Don't have time limits and be flexible. When you have questions, ask the social workers at the hospital or at the Family House. And last BUT NOT LEAST: Remember your health and self-care.
