For 15 years, Gift of Life Howie's House has been a home away from home for transplant patients and families who must travel to Philadelphia for lifesaving care.

What began as a place to stay has grown into something far deeper – a community of comfort, stability, and connection during one of life's most overwhelming seasons. Since opening our doors in 2011, thousands of families have found rest after long hospital days, shared meals with others

who understand, and reassurance that they are not alone.

A GROWING NEED: HELP EXPAND OUR SHUTTLE PROGRAM

Transplant care often means leaving home for weeks or months – navigating early-morning appointments, unfamiliar hospitals, and the daily stress of getting to and from lifesaving care.

At Gift of Life Howie's House, our free shuttle program is one of many ways we seek to reduce burdens to accessing care. Providing reliable transportation to six area transplant centers, the shuttle helps families focus on healing. It's more than a ride; it's a familiar face, a steady routine, and one less worry during an incredibly uncertain time.

As demand for the House grows, so does reliance on the shuttle. When our primary vehicle is unavailable, families face limited, costly alternatives that strain a service they depend on every day.

Bob Baur has been driving guests to and from appointments for more than eight years. Volunteering in memory of his daughter Kellie who became an organ donor in 2014, Bob has become a familiar and comforting presence for hundreds of families.

"WHEN YOU'RE SITTING JUST A FEW FEET FROM EACH OTHER IN THE SHUTTLE, A SENSE OF COMMUNITY FORMS," Bob shares. "Being able to ride together and talk takes some of the weight off their shoulders. The shuttle gives families comfort and confidence that they'll get where they need to go safely."



Rick Hasz, Gift of Life President and CEO brought the shuttle to MTF Biologics in August to pick up items MTF staff collected for the House pantry.

Past guest Joanne Hopkins knows that feeling well. She and her husband, James Sr., have stayed at the House for more than 135 nights while caring for their son James after his lifesaving heart transplant. Traveling more than 300 miles from rural northwestern Pennsylvania, the House shuttle service relieved the stress of navigating city traffic, parking, and unfamiliar routes.

"THE SHUTTLE SERVICE BROUGHT OUR FAMILY IMMENSE COMFORT AND SECURITY," Joanne says. "Knowing we had safe, reliable transportation each day greatly reduced our anxiety during such a difficult time."

Since opening our doors in 2011, the shuttle program has grown alongside the needs of the families we serve. What began as a single eight-passenger SUV expanded to minivans – and in 2018, with community support, to our current 15-passenger shuttle.

Today, we are at another moment of growth. Adding a second shuttle will allow us to serve more families, provide dependable backup transportation, and ensure this essential service remains accessible and reliable for years to come.

HONORING A LEGACY OF LEADERSHIP AND COMPASSION



Gift of Life Howie's House joins the entire Gift of Life community in sharing that after 27 years of extraordinary service, **JAN L. WEINSTOCK, ESQ.** will retire this year from her role as Chief Administrative Officer and General Counsel. Her tenure has been defined by vision, integrity, and a deep commitment to the families we serve.

Throughout her career, Jan helped strengthen organ donation and transplantation nationwide through impactful Pennsylvania legislation and played a pivotal role in the vision, design, and creation of Gift of Life Howie's House. "Opening the doors of the House completed the circle of care we provide at Gift of Life," Jan shared, noting that the quiet moments – seeing families find comfort and relief – have been especially meaningful.

Jan often reflects on the donor families, recipients, and advocates who inspire her, saying, "It grounds me and centers me knowing that people are fundamentally good." In 2025 alone, Jan's leadership helped drive record-breaking transplant numbers and supported the House in surpassing \$17 million in subsidized care.

As she looks toward retirement, we are deeply grateful for Jan's lasting impact and the strong foundation she leaves behind.

Over the past 15 years, Gift of Life Howie's House has grown in many ways, but the dedication of our volunteers has remained constant. Among them is Team Spiers, a family whose service has been part of the House since its earliest days.

As we celebrate 15 years of serving transplant families, we are deeply thankful to the Spiers family – and to all our volunteers – whose generosity makes the House a place of comfort, stability, and community.

The Spiers family began cooking meals at the House in 2011, shortly after the loss of their beloved Kevin, an organ and tissue donor. What began as a tribute to Kevin's life quickly became a tradition of service rooted in love, remembrance, and generosity. As the House grew, so did the Spiers family – welcoming new partners, children, and even grandchildren into both their lives and the House kitchen.

For 15 years, they have prepared a meal at the House every month, offering comfort and connection alongside nourishment. Last spring, Team Spiers marked their 150th visit – an extraordinary milestone led by Kevin's mom, Joan Spiers.

"The gift of life the House offers families has inspired and strengthened our compassion," Joan shares.

Cultivating Support: Caregivers Don't Grow Alone

Caregivers play a central role in the transplant journey. They manage medications, attend appointments, provide emotional reassurance, and often put their own needs aside to keep everything moving forward. While transplant care often centers on the patient, the well-being of caregivers is just as important. Caregivers do not grow, heal, or sustain themselves alone. Support from others is essential.

When caregivers lack support, the strain can lead to burnout, isolation, depression, and declines in their own health. When caregivers are supported, they are better able to manage stress, navigate uncertainty, and continue providing care over time. Support does not have to come from one place. In fact, no single source can do it all.

Family and friends are often the first layer of support. Loved ones can help with meals, errands, appointments, or step in as backup caregivers when respite is needed. Even small breaks can make a meaningful difference.

Local community connections also matter. Community groups, gyms, clubs, or neighborhood organizations can provide routine, connection, and a sense of belonging outside of the medical world. These spaces help caregivers stay grounded when caregiving begins to take over daily life.

For some caregivers, spiritual or religious communities offer comfort and stability during difficult times. These groups may provide emotional support, practical help, or simply a place to feel understood.

Mental health support is another critical resource. Therapy and caregiver support groups give caregivers space to process fear, grief, exhaustion, and changing roles. Talking with professionals or peers who understand the transplant experience can reduce isolation and support long-term well-being.

Medical and practical supports are equally important. Home health care, home care aides, therapy services, and connection to primary care providers can ease the daily demands of caregiving. Accepting help is not a failure. It is a way to protect both the caregiver and the patient.

For caregivers returning home after a hospital stay or time at Gift of Life Howie's House, it can feel like a vital support system has disappeared. Taking time to reflect on what was most helpful and finding ways to continue that support at home can ease this transition. Caregivers should also remember that transplant teams and caregiver support programs remain available, even from a distance.

Caregiving is an act of love, but it should never be an act of isolation. When caregivers are supported, they are stronger, healthier, and more resilient.
